Remembrance Day . . Re-Enactment Parade

The long-awaited day started with slight rain in the morning while we were bringing the "Sydney" into town from the Men's Shed where it had been constructed on the back of a ute.

The morning was taken up with placing witches hats, signage, etc around town. The SES organised the road closures, and horses and carriages started to arrive at the back of IGA. Then the cars assembled at front of Maleny Lodge Guesthouse and people in costume appeared in town. The coffee shops and vantage points began to fill.

RSL, Rotary and Lions members were involved with organising participants into cars and buggies, shuttling cars and trucks, informing people of the parade, handing out info sheets, selling badges etc.

SES closed the streets at 10am and the Parade commenced, led by Nick the Piper down Maple Street, across the bridge and up Bunya Street. Dispersal began with school children into the School car park, all equestrian units went to the back of State School and the remainder to RSL for the Remembrance Day Service.

The Parade consisted of 225 participants, 22 Community groups, two sons in the same role as their fathers in the original Parade, 17 families including descendants of those in original Parade, 80 + school children, 5 buggies and horses, 7 vintage vehicles, 5th Light Horse in WW1 troopers uniforms, clothing, flags and a vehicle from a number of museums, TS Centaur cadets in the "Sydney" replica and more than I can list here. Everyone who said they would turn up, did, and dressed accordingly. In some, the attention to detail was brilliant. We have over 450 photos and videos freely available for anyone who wants view them. (Please talk to Jen or Chris B.)

Even though this was facilitated by Maleny RSL, it was a whole of Maleny Community event and without the input and support of a vast number of individuals, organizations and businesses it would not have happened.

Did the Parade act as a conduit to draw attention to the Centenary of end of WW1 and the beginning of an era of Peace?... you betcha!!

Director: Glen Bergman

Glen was born and raised at Home Hill on the south side of the Burdekin River, the local playground for him and his friends. He completed his apprenticeship as a fitter and turner with Home Hill Engineering Works. He was called up for National Service 1969 and qualified as a armament fitter, and served with 4th Field Regt Lad, posted to 107 Field Battery.
